# MESSAGE FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR YASMIN TOMKINSON

#### Dear Friends of Literacy,

Cape Fear Literacy Council (CFLC) was founded on the principle of "Each One Teach One." This means that a person who has the gift of being able to read, speak English, or do math can directly help another learn to do the same. CFLC provides the high-quality training, research-based materials, on-going support, and infrastructure. Last year 176 dedicated volunteers gave their time and talent to help 492 students transform their lives through the power of education.

Each "one" matters. Consider the Adult Literacy student whose life has changed profoundly: "I passed my classes and my exam and got my CNA license. Two years ago, I didn't even think I would graduate high school, and now I'm a Certified Nursing Assistant." Or the ESL volunteer whose world is enriched: "My student is going to every single class you offer that fits with her schedule, in addition to her sessions with me. She's so bright and dedicated! We've been working on idioms, history, and American phrases. She keeps me on my toes. It's incredible."

Each "one" also extends to our supporters. Last year, as we responded to cuts in federal funding, one very generous donor gave us \$10,000. That extraordinary donation was a kind of tipping point; it took the pressure off during a challenging time, and then we were bolstered by other individual donations as well as incredible corporate partnerships with Live Oak Bank and the StarNews to end the year very well, after all.

Another "one" of our 647 supporters from last year, the Landfall Foundation, made it possible for CFLC to replace a failing HVAC system and to prevent a serious plumbing problem through a special capital grant. There have been many hot and cold days that we have been particularly grateful for that "one!"

Each and every "one" who is involved in the Literacy Council makes a difference. And together, we are more than the sum of our parts. When we put all of our "ones" together, we have the ability to effect real change in our community for this generation and for those to come






## YEAR IN REVIEW - ESL PROGRAM

The English as a Second Language Program offers free English classes and individual tutoring, in person and via Skype, for speakers of other languages. We provide classes at the Beginning, Intermediate, and Advanced levels every morning, Monday-Thursday, from 9:30-11:00 am, in addition to evening classes on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 6:30-8:30 pm. The Citizenship program has been moved to the CFLC site on Sunday afternoons and now includes N-400 preparation and mock interviews, in addition to the history and civics English class.

We have implemented a new curriculum for classroom instructors and we now offer classes focused specifically on listening and writing skills. The program staff has also created several professional development training programs to be launched in 2018. Melanie Nelson is the ESL Program Director, and Lauren Rogers is the ESL Program Assistant. They both joined CFLC as new staff members in April 2017.



#### **NOTABLE ACHIEVEMENTS**

- Of the post-tested students, 76% showed quantitative improvement
- 43% increased a full Educational Functioning Level (EFL)
- 47 students reported getting new jobs
- 2 students were promoted at work, and 2 additional students reported earning pay raises
- 4 students became community volunteers
- 17 students reported academic goals; 4 students passed portions of the GED
- 1 student obtained his GED and will begin taking college classes in 2018
- 3 students got their driver's licenses
- 7 students became US citizens

#### LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES

- We had 53 active one-on-one pairs, and each week conducted 18 free English classes, 4 of which were hosted off-site
- We offered 2 special interest workshops: one for parents with children in NHC Schools, and one for people who are studying to get their NC Learner's Permit and Driver's License
- We hosted several "Coffee and Conversation" meet-ups

#### STUDENTS IN PROGRAM YEAR 2016-2017

- We served 323students who logged a total of 8,511 instructional hours!
- 170 students were new intakes; 153 were continuing students
- 68 students studied more than 40 hours
- 32 students studied more than 70 hours
- Students came to us from 40 different countries
- 20% Asian, 13% Black, 56% Hispanic, 1% Pacific Islander/Native American, 10% White


The Adult Literacy program offers free and confidential evaluation and tutoring for students who need to improve their reading, writing, math, computer, and/or test-taking skills. Our students range from beginning literacy to those prepping for the GED or entrance exams at CFCC.

The core of our program is one-on-one tutoring, but we also offer small supplemental classes, which broaden students' knowledge base and skill sets, offer valuable opportunities to expand their social interactions, and increase the intensity of their instruction.

#### **NOTABLE ACHIEVEMENTS**

- 75% of students showed quantitative improvement on post-tests, 59% went up a full Educational Functioning Level (EFL)
- 2 students achieved a diploma, 3 more passed at least one module of the GED
- 3 students passed the CFCC Entrance Exam, 2 received Career Readiness Certifications, and 13 entered community college programs
- 2 students obtained driver's licenses
- 11 students reported voting for the first time (program year runs from 7/1/16 to 6/30/17)

#### PROFILES IN LITERACY: WHAT MOTIVATES OUR STUDENTS?



Reported Adult Literacy Student Goals

Our students come to us at a variety of levels and with many different goals. One reason CFLC is successful is that we can individually work with a student's real-life goals to produce real-world results, whether that is getting a diploma, getting a job, reading aloud in church, or learning to vote. When a student reports a fundamental change in his/her life as a result of increased educational skills, it is an amazingly rewarding moment for everyone involved.

#### STUDENTS IN 2017

- We served 169 students who logged a total of 6,263 instructional hours!
- •We had 138 active one-on-one pairs and offered 15 small classes
- •86 students were new intakes; 83 were continuing students
- •57 students studied more than 40 hours
- •62% are Black, 30% White, 4% Hispanic, 3% Native American, 1% mixed/other
- •66% do not have a high school diploma; 31% report their long-term goal is the GED/Diploma



#### **EMPLOYMENT IN 2017**

- •58% of AL students reported job goals in 2017 either to enter the workforce, get a promotion, or retain their current job
- •34% are employed, 36% are unemployed, 30% are not in the labor force
- •21 students with job goals reported a new or better job; an additional 13 students with retention goals succeeded in keeping their jobs

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
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


